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Solar speed sign preliminary results

Airport Road average speed lowered by 5 mph

the last few months our new interactive solar speed signs (the first in the City of Monterey) on Airport Road have been going through technical test runs. The first few weeks they appeared to be turned off. They were actually recording all speeds and traffic counts to set a baseline record of that streets traffic. Now they light up and announce any speed over the posted limit of 25 mph. The most recent downloaded report shows the 85% percentile average speed before the sign to be 33 mph. and that same average after the

sign of 28 mph. This is a significant average speed reduction.

Speed enforcement is an essential part of our traffic calming plan. So far, CONA cannot find out when the police will restart radar enforcement.

Obviously, this picture of a vehicle speeding at 38 mph shows some people just don't care. It is clear that the police need to address traffic enforcement if we are to make our streets safe for everyone.

This year CONA is asking for the similar signs on Casanova and Ramona

Over the years, the Fairgrounds has worked at being a better neighbor and community partner to the Casanova Oak Knoll Neighborhood Association. Part of our dedication to the community is making the grounds more aesthetically appealing. We are pleased to announce the replacement of our cyclone fence

Greetings from the Monterey County along Fairground Road! Currently, we are in the bid process for the replacement residents across from Gate 9. We look of over 2,000 feet of fence from Gate 1 (by the Monterey Pines Golf Course entrance) to the corner of the Carnival Lot, past Gate 9. The sample design is shown in the picture inside and will be most similar to what is in place at the Naval Postgraduate School along Del Monte Avenue. Along with the new fence, we will be utilizing Gate 8 in the Carnival Lot across the street from Longs Drugs and installing a 16' – 20' driveway for access from Fairground Road as opposed to Airport Road. The new driveway will help to alleviate ex-

cess traffic along Airport Road for those forward to the completion of this project prior to the 2007 Monterey County Fair to be held August 14-19th.

Disturbing issues continue to return

Two issues keep coming back to our area. The first one had a full hearing before our City Council on February 6th. Before them was a hearing to revoke the use permit of a massage parlor near N. Fremont Street. In an undercover sting, the Monterey Police Department raided the massage parlor and arrested their employees for engaging in soliciting for prostitution. This exact same business had the exact same problem several years ago. It has been common knowledge that this criminal activity has been back for years. So before an audience of over 100 and on live television broadcast on Channel 25 a police spokesperson elaborated in detail the two separate sting operations. To listen to this litany of repulsive criminal activity near our homes was appalling. Just when the police spokesperson finished and the mayor called for public comment a young man got up and told his story. How this house of prostitution neagatively affected his family. You see, he was their customer and he confessed his shame before life television. He had the courage to ask the council to close this business. Talk about negative public relations. In attendance were several N. Fremont business owners who have been devoting their lives to reversing the image of N. Fremont. They were awestruck that the City of Monterey cannot keep this influence away from us. One of them said "....they need to make it go away". Why can't they do this? Why is this area the only one in the city that continues with these problems? Now is the time for you to ask these questions!

Many years ago the old Brickhouse (now Eddies) was a huge problem, constant police calls, violence, and disturbing the adjacent homes. In fact in 1989 CONA successfully opposed a use permit application by them for live entertainment. This lead to the City of Monterey requiring the zoning ordinance for C-2 (Commercial on N. Fremont) adjacent to residential to have a special provision, live entertainment is prohibited. No variances or appeals are allowed, live entertainment is prohibited. In February 2005 our residents noted advertisements for an Erotic Art Show at Eddies. Their alerts to the city resulted in the show being moved to another venue not adjacent to homes.

Five weeks ago residents again learned that live entertainment was coming back. They notified the city. On February 8 a full page story appeared in the Herald Go! p.18 advertising a burlesque show called "Chica Boom". The city was informed. No action. The first show took place February 14th. No action. Second show February 17th. the city noted that yes there was live entertainment. The owner claimed they had a grandfathered prior use. The same city management was in place for all these events over the years. The third show is going to be February 24th. The business is now advertised as "Eddies Honky Tonk" with other live entertainment events already listed in the Herald.

Use permits denied, prior code violations enforced, new zoning written and adopted and still nothing changes. CONA will give you an opportunity to express your opinions to two of our newly elected councilpersons at our annual meeting March 14, 2007. Nancy Selfridge and Frank Sollecito will be there to hear and understand your concerns.

For several years Safeway Stores have maintained they need extra storage for Turkeys and Hams at their North Fremont Store during the November December Holidays. To accomplish this they would bring in a large refrigerated trailer and locate it on the North side of the building. With the relocation of the Safeway Store to the old Ralph's location there will be a loading dock on the West side of the building where three large doors are now located. Casanova-Oak Knoll Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Due Soon

On November 8, 2006, Casanova-Oak Knoll residents, business owners and property owners met with City staff and participated in a public meeting to identify strategies for revitalizing the neighborhood. The results are being compiled by City staff and developed into a strategy document that will be released for public comment and put before the Planning Commission and City Council for adoption.

Thereafter, it will be submitted to HUD for approval. Upon approval, the neighborhood will be designated as a Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Area, enabling Community Development Block Grant funds to be used to reach eligible applicants with higher annual household incomes than presently authorized.

The Revitalization Strategy goals will address: North Fremont redevelopment, property maintenance, elimination of visual blight, housing rehabilitation, extending home ownership opportunities, traffic, parking, development of additional recreational facilities, and airport conflicts.

The Casanova-Oak Knoll strategy is the second of two neighborhood revitalization efforts that are currently being developed by City staff. The Oak Grove neighborhood revitalization strategy is anticipated to be released by the end of February and set for public hearing. The Casanova-Oak Knoll strategy will follow shortly thereafter. Your comments and participation in the continued public process are welcomed.

North Fremont Street Streetscape Plan

One of the discussion items at our annual meeting will be this streetscape plan. How wide should the sidewalks be, pedestrian safety, setbacks of new buildings from the street, landscaping setbacks, allowable building heights and sizes of new buildings. It will be your chance to influence the process for the future of our commercial area.

CITY OFFICE SPACE SHORTAGE

The City of Monterey is grappling with a shortage of space for staff because of plumbing problems that closed two office buildings and displaced nearly 30 employees. A water leak in a modular building on Madison Street forced the Human Resources and Finance departments and the City Attorney's office to relocate to temporary quarters. A second water leak in the historic Vasquez Adobe pushed the Recreation Department into temporary trailers parked behind City Hall. To accommodate the trailers, Dutra Street was made one-way from Jefferson Street to Madison Street.

The Madison Street modular, which was put in place in 1985 for an expected five-year life span, is a total loss and will be demolished. The Vasquez Adobe, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, is reparable and will be returned to service.

In the meantime, the City Council approved the purchase of the Monterey Convalescent Hospital at 735 Pacific Street for interim office space. The now-vacant hospital will be renovated into new office space and should be ready to be occupied by late summer.

Monterey Peninsula Airport Noise Exposure Maps Update

Noise Exposure Maps were last prepared for the airport in 1997, and since that time, substantial changes in the aviation industry have resulted in operational changes at the airport. In the past ten years, the type of aircraft and number of operations has altered the noise condition at the airport, and it is therefore necessary to reevaluate the extent of the airport's noise exposure. The updated Noise Exposure Maps will be based on the current operating conditions at the airport, and the forecast condition will be based on projected changes in local and aviation industry trends.

Updating the Noise Exposure Maps is anticipated to take approximately eight months and will include several opportunities for public input.

Public Involvement

The Monterey Peninsula Airport District encourages public participation in this process and has provided several opportunities for concerned residents to express their views on the study and the aircraft noise condition at the airport. All study materials will be available through the project website hosted by the consultant. Residents are also encouraged to offer comments and learn about the study directly by attending public information workshops that will be held expressly for this purpose. Three public meetings will be held during the study process. Notice of these meetings will be placed in the local newspaper and on the airport and project websites.

Outcome

The resulting product of the Noise Exposure Maps Update will be a report documenting the analysis undertaken to update the Noise Exposure Maps. Upon local approval and Federal Aviation Administration acceptance, these maps will be con-

sidered the official exhibits detailing the extent of noise exposure at Monterey Peninsula Airport.

Monterey Fire Department Changes

City governments are formed for one purpose, to supply essential services to its residents. Public safety would be at the top of any surveyed list. The following is a little history to consider.

For the last 50 or so years we have had 3 fire stations in Monterey all of which served city of Monterey residents and businesses. We contracted out our fire services to Sand City and Del Rey Oaks. Del Rey Oaks was dropped when they stopped paying the bill. They still owe Monterey around \$250,000. Recently we added the DLI, the Navy School, La Mesa and Fleet Numerical. The Navy school had 2 engines and 8 firemen. They are now gone. We absorbed their duties with no increases in Monterey firemen. Yes, we are reimbursed but we are short the men and equipment.

Now we have a contract to supply Monterey Fire Division Deputy Chiefs to Pacific Grove. Talks are under way with Carmel too. Regionalism is claimed to be cost effective. Asking city employees to increase their workload, take more responsibility with no increase in employees or pay? Marina residents had a chance to be involved in a decision to combine with Seaside. They said no! Apparently it was a good idea for Seaside but a poor financial decision for Marina. In our case Pacific Grove and Carmel are in financial crises. P.G. has reported that using Monterey Deputy Chiefs save them \$140,000 per year. Monterey government stated that they would make \$40,000 per year.

How far can we market Monterey government to other cities and still maintain a viable public safety department? On a good day it is difficult to maintain coverage of our city. On a bad day? Maybe we should have a choice, too.

New Mixed Use Commercial building on N. Fremont Street

This is a proposed schematic diagram of the proposed mixed-use building to replace the Bay Pet Hospital. The top floor will contain two 2-bedroom one-bath apartments. The street level floor has two approximately 1750 square feet retail locations. Parking is in the rear. Two 750 square foot patios are in the front part of the building (the Fremont side).

This project is in preliminary design phase and is still at press time before Monterey city staff. Water credits will be the main factor in determining the types of commercial uses that are allowed in the building.

Since there is not an adopted N. Fremont Street Streetscape Plan we do not have a vision for the future appearance and makeup of this commercial area. This project and the one talked about for years on the Eddies site will set a standard for the rest of the street. The CONA annual meeting has scheduled time for a discussion on what you see as a vision for our commercial district.







C.O.N.A. ACHIEVEMENTS
