CONA Spring Cleanup set for June 18th.

Mark your calendars for this one time cleanup project!

he neighborhood cleanup plans have taken extra time to set up. The program manager left the city and while everyone was trying to deal with this we have had one of the most unusual winters in decades. We needed a rain free weekend, we will see.

The City of Monterey housing and property management office has been working with the CONA Neighborhood Association to program a neighborhood clean-up event. The event is scheduled to occur on Saturday, June 18, 2011. On this date Monterey City Disposal Company will coordinate curbside pick-up of large and miscellaneous items like large awkward items, as well as, household hazardous waste.

Monterey City Disposal Service will also provide assistance when needed to

get the large and/or bulky items out to the curb for those households who can not manage the move on their own.

Funding for the clean-up event is being provided through local use of Federal Community Development Block Grant funds that have been received by the City of Monterey.

In order to assist the Neighborhood and Monterey City Disposal Service in determining the full scope of the clean-up need, the City's housing and property management office staff will be calling all of the residents who have responded to the CONA Spring Cleanup Survey to clarify the number and types of waste items that are intended to be turned in for pick-up. The housing and property management office will also be using these calls to inform the residents of

other types of assistance programs that are currently available to senior and low and moderate income households in the Neighborhood.

If you did not turn in a survey form but you still would like to participate in the pick-up event you should call the housing and property management office and leave your contact information.

A staff member will get back to you with questions on your pick-up needs and information on the program. The office number to call is (831) 646-1743. Please call and leave your name and contact information.

A staff member will be returning these calls on a regular basis.

CONA 2011 Annual Meeting

2010 turned out to be a year of continuous follow-ups to keep our neighborhood revitalization program slowly moving forward. The Spring Cleanup will be part of this program.

Representatives from the Monterey City Housing Department will attend the meeting to answer questions regarding the cleanup and to describe the various aid programs for our residents.

At this time the 2011 Neighborhood Improvement Program is in doubt because of the economic situation with the City of Monterey. We started the year with a \$5 million dollar deficit. Budget reductions to staff have at this point reduced the deficit to \$4 million dollars. The present retirement system (PERS) for city employees has proven to be unsustainable. This week the City sent out 38 notices to present employees stating that their positions may be eliminated. About 50 positions were cut last year. This all computes to vastly reduced services to our residents, and the continued cancellations of city events and celebrations.

Still on hold after 3 years are many previously approved Neighborhood Improvement Projects. For CONA, those projects on hold are traffic calming elements to complete our traffic plan and also replacement street trees. NIP has always contributed more than a fair share in the cities financial problems. It is time those already approved projects be allowed to be completed. If we wait any longer, the estimated budgets for these projects will be totally out of date and no longer financially feasible. Our elected representatives need to hear from everyone of you. To be silent now is to undo years of hard work, public participation and any possible progress for all our neighborhoods.

Foreclosures in the city and our neighborhood in particular are finally slowing down. The total number now is well past 30. Several of these are condo units at the Cypress Park complex on Casanova. The City of Pacific Grove is in the process of passing a "Blight ordinance" aimed at banks not maintaining foreclosed properties. This is something that Monterey needs to look at very closely.

N. Fremont Street is currently in a dire condition. We have the Pet Hospital vacant and deteriorating very badly. Eddies is vacant and in a similar state. Norma Jeans is out of business and Doctors on Duty has a sign announcing a moving date of May 2 to a new location in Seaside. The Blockbuster chain is in bankruptcy. The new N. Fremont Specific Plan draft is *proposing* at this time a 300% FAR for properties along Bruce Lane, **a 3 story maximum**.

It is vital that our organization stays active and engaged at all levels. Your participation is of paramount importance. We cannot afford to let our neighborhood deteriorate.

Please come to our annual meeting, volunteer if you can, participate in the Spring Cleanup, and talk to your neighbors. If you have not filled out your neighborhood watch cards from last year, you have a great reason to meet and exchange contact information with your neighbors. This is the best way to keep our neighborhood safe. The blank forms are available on our website at www.cona.info.

We will have a short discussion about Neighborhood Emergency Preparedness. This is preliminary to a June 22nd. meeting at our community center to discuss how you can prepare for an emergency, how our organization is going to help and to present brand new information about new science on possible hazards in our area. We will introduce members of CONA who have completed CERT training. Get to know them now, not afterward!

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CERT (Community Emergency Response Team)

In 1995, I signed up for the course that preceded the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) course with my wife. I had been involved in emergency planning for many years but being able to attend with my wife to address very local emergency problems had a certain appeal to me. The completion of the course also made her feel better about preparing for and getting through a disaster. We completed the course and later updated it to become CERT members.

Now operating under the National Emergency Management System, it is still practiced under the Incident Command System that will apply at all levels of emergency responses – even our very own neighborhood working with the City staff.

This is a city preparation plan that has real merit. It is volunteers working in their own neighborhoods preparing and helping their families and neighborhoods should something happen. We need more people to become part of the effort. Our neighborhood used to have over twice as many CERT volunteers. Many now have moved away or otherwise cannot participate so we need to refresh the CERT membership.

On a personal level, it is a planned approach that teaches people how to prepare their homes, train family members, and work with their neighborhoods, other CERT units and city staff. The training covers this and goes into specific things like training to show new members a planned emergency response approach; everything from how to turn off water, gas and electricity, how to store water for use in an emergency, and how to assist family members and friends in an emergency. It is a great opportunity for family members to use and prepare for an emergency but the information is useful at any time. There is no charge for those participating and there is no requirement for active participation with the teams but some volunteer time is most welcome and rewarding.

There is an old expression that, "All politics are local." This applies to the politics that really mean something during a disaster or emergency. If you are not a part of the solution during such an event, you may be irreverent or just plain in the way. We need people to be a part of that solution and being a local emergency response member is a good way to become part of the preparation and solution. Operate locally and have a voice where it matters.

We recently saw what can happen in what is probably the most prepared nation in the world, Japan. Because of the training in the coastal communities, even a 30 second warning helped many people get moving before the waves struck. We need more people prepared to assist their family and neighbors in the event of such an emergency.

Tsunami articles, are you paying attention?

Last years April and August CONA newsletters both had articles about Tsunami awareness. The August newsletter included a pamphlet for your information. Last months disaster in Japan just put more focus on potential threats to our own community.

The police and fire department has its own CERT automated activation capabilities. The calls went out to CERT volunteers at 5:45a.m. with a request to report by 6:15 a.m. to Fire Station #1. 39 CERT's responded and were dispatched to warn those on the waterfront of the possibility of high waves. This is the largest CERT response to date! One young mother with 3 small children insisted on her right to take her children on the beach to see the wave. She did! This is an example of being part of the problem and not part of the solution.

Do you have an emergency plan for your family? Do you have a plan B if Plan A cannot work?
